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Safety Concerns

Caring for a loved one with a cognitive impairment will have its challenges. A loved one with memory loss may feel confused and frightened in their own home environment. An individual with aphasia may be unable to verbally express wants, needs, or discomforts. A person with balance and gait difficulties may need assistive devices to lessen unsteadiness and decrease the chance of falls. As the caregiver, you can create a safer environment for your loved one, and by doing so, you can help your loved one feel more relaxed and less overwhelmed. The first step is to take an objective look at your loved one's environment. As you assess the environment, try to see things from the perspective of the person with the diagnosis.

A person with dementia may not be able to understand the importance of certain actions or be able to respond to environmental cues for behavior, as they once could. For example, your loved one may not remember why it is important to dress appropriately for the weather, or why it is important to turn off appliances when they are not in use.

Taking preventative actions and introducing assistive devices may reduce the level of frustration for your loved one and decrease the level of anxiety for you, the caregiver.



Communication

- Keep communication on an adult level. The person you are speaking to should be treated with respect and dignity.
- Be patient. The person with dementia is unable to process thoughts quickly. You will need to slow down to a pace of speaking and movement that they can follow.
- Simplify routines. Many accidents happen in the process of performing activities of daily living such as toileting, bathing, dressing, and taking medications.
- Create an emergency plan. Prepare a list of emergency phone numbers and post it near the phone.
- Remove any items from the home environment that could be harmful.
- Be realistic about what you can expect of yourself and your loved one. You will never be able to foresee every risk or prevent every problem.





Solution Suggestions for Common Challenges

Adaptations can be made to the home environment to help all family members feel safe and comfortable.

First, consider your environment in terms of safety areas. Some areas may need to be avoided by the person with the diagnosis, such as places where toxic or dangerous items are stored. These could be basement areas, the garage, or even a closet. We will refer to these areas as "Danger Zones." Danger zones need to be locked, alarmed, or controlled by wander-prevention devices. You may also try securing a black mat in front of the door to danger zones. The black mat may be perceived as a hole to be avoided. A secured black mat may also be helpful in front of exit doors to prevent night time wandering.

Another area to identify is a place where the caregiver can go to be alone. "Burn Out" is a common problem for caregivers. It is often more pronounced when the caregiver is unable to remove themselves from the caregiver role. Look for a place where you can get away and relax. This could be a comfortable spot on the porch, or a guest bedroom. We will refer to this area as the "Respite Zone." Your respite zone can be used when someone else is watching the person with dementia. Your respite zone needs to be a place where you are accessible, but free from unnecessary interruption. You will want to have a phone handy. Instruct the caregiver assisting you that you should only be disturbed in case of emergency.



Finally, you will need to create an area where the person with the diagnosis is free to roam, rummage, rearrage and hide things. We will refer to this area as the "Safe Zone." Evaluate the area for any safety concerns so that this area can be available for your loved one. Your will want to remove any medications, dangerous tools, appliances, and chemicals from the area. Also remove any important documents and valuable or breakable objects. Cover any outlets with safety plugs, and remove any rugs or other tripping hazards.



The Safe Zone

In Stairways, Hallways, Pathways

- Have handrails on both sides of the stairs, if possible, and keep them tightly fastened.
- Make sure the stairs are well lit, with switches at the top and bottom of stairs.
- Keep walkway areas tidy and free of tripping hazards.
- Check that all carpets are fixed. Put no-slip strips on tile and wooden floors.
- Don't use throw rugs or small area rugs.

In Bathrooms

- Mount grab bars near toilets, and on both the inside and outside of your tub and shower.
- Place non-skid mats, strips, or even carpet on all surfaces that may get wet for extra traction.
- Turn on night lights.

In the Bedroom

- Put night lights and switches close to the bed.
- Keep a telephone near the bed.

In Other Living Areas

- Keep electric cords and telephone wires near walls and away from walking paths.
- Tack down all carpets and large area rugs firmly to the floor.
- Arrange your furniture and other objects so they are out of walkways. Do not rearrange furniture unnecessarily.
- Make sure sofas and chairs are the right height for your loved one to get in and out of easily.



- Keep items your loved one uses frequently within easy reach.
- Don't put items out of reach. If the person with dementia should not touch it, remove it from the room.
- Know where your pet(s) are whenever the person with dementia is standing or walking.
- Keep emergency numbers in large print near each telephone.

In Stairways, Hallways, Pathways

- Mark the top and bottom of the stairs with bright neon tape.
- Install gates at the top and bottom of the stairs.
- Install a handrail on both sides of the stairs (if possible).
- Install handrails on stairs, grab bars in bathrooms and other devices designed for those who need physical assistance.
- Consider labeling doors with signs (Bathroom)



Extra-Wide Super Gate \$50 and up

This gate is 31" tall and fits openings up to 62" wide. It slides together, and swings out of the way when not in use. It can be removed from the mounting brackets for easy storage. It has easy one-handed operation.



Stair Rail Net

\$25

This 10' durable mesh net for stair railings has universal sized railing ties and screw eyes to help keep the net securely attached.





Walk-Through Stair Gate \$30-\$35

This gate easily unlocks and swings open. It can be removed from its low-profile mounting hardware when not in use.



Non-slip Carpet Pads \$15 and up

Non-slip carpet pads are available in many shapes, sizes, and colors. Check your local hardware store or online.



Stair Lifts Prices Vary

Stair lifts are custom made to fit a stairwell, therefore they vary in price. A trained technician does an assessment to consider factors such as the length and width of your staircase, its rise and tread, lift position (right/left), and outlet requirements.







Brightly Colored Reflective Tape \$3.50

Brightly colored tape with reflective qualities can help a person with impaired vision to identify steps. Some research suggests neon green is most easily visible.



Door Knob Extender

A door knob extender helps those with disabilities that interfere with grasping, to open doors more easily.

Walker Basket

\$15-\$25

A walker basket keeps frequently used items within easy reach.



In Bathrooms

- Remove door locks.
- Place a bathmat, or adhesive no-slip strips, in the tub and/or shower.
- Consider using adhesive no-slip strips or carpeting on the floor to increase traction.
- Install padlocks or childproof latches on cabinets containing medicine, cleaning fluids and other dangerous products.
- Install secure grab bars around the toilet and use an elevated toilet seat or a free standing bed-side commode (with the bed pan removed) placed over the toilet.
- Install grab bars in tub and use a bath chair or stool in the tub or shower.
- Use a hand-held shower nozzle.
- Cover the faucet in the tub with a soft spongey material to help prevent injury if the patient falls in the tub.
- Color-code faucet handles (red for hot and blue for cold) and keep water temperature at or below 120 degrees to prevent scalding.
- Consider labeling doors to rooms such as "bedroom," "bathroom," etc.







Tub Grab Bars \$20-\$100

Portable Grab Bar \$20-\$175

Heavy duty plastic construction. Attaches with suction. Not recommended for fiberglass showers or tubs.



Elevated Toilet Seat \$30-\$120

Clamp-On Tub Grab Bar \$20-\$70

Coated metal or plastic grab bars. Can support up to 300 lbs. *Not recommended for fiberglass tubs*.



Bathtub Transfer Bench \$30-\$130

A bathtub transfer bench is essential for getting a person with limited mobility in and out of the tub/shower.



Tub Bench \$20-\$40

A tub/shower bench is essential for the comfort and safety of a senior in the shower or tub.



Hand Held Shower Nozzle \$20-\$50

A hand held shower nozzle helps people shower more safely in a seated position.



Inflatable Sink \$20-\$40

An inflatable sink can help with bathing or washing the hair comfortably without the risk of bathing in a tub or shower.







Non-Slip Bath Mat \$10-\$35

A non-slip, non-skid bath mat helps prevent falls in the shower and bath.



Toilet Safety Grab Rail \$75-\$150

Bedside Commode \$35 and up

Used in a bedroom if traveling to the bathroom is difficult. It can also give extra stability in the bathroom when placed over the toilet with the pan removed.




In the Bedroom

- Keep important and emergency phone numbers accessible.
- Ensure adequate lighting throughout the home; install night lights.
- Keep entryways, hallways, and floors free of clutter, extension cords and scatter rugs; avoid placing furniture in walking path areas.
- Make sure floors have good traction, so every member of the family can move around easily. Remove or firmly tape down any scatter rugs, area rugs or moveable carpets.
- Rubber-soled shoes/slippers can help avoid falls.
- Keep a working flashlight by the bed.
- Use nightlights to light the path to the bathroom.
- Consider labeling doors to rooms such as "bedroom," "bathroom," etc.
- If the person hallucinates or is bothered by his or her reflection, cover or remove mirrors.
- The shadows cast on the wall or ceiling by nightlights and lamps, can be difficult for the person with dementia to interpret as shadows. If your loved one appears fearful of shadows, adjust by using overhead lighting.
- Use bed rails, if needed, around the patient's bed.
- Ensure that fan slats on portable fans are small enough to keep fingers out; use fans with plastic blades.

In the Kitchen

- Remove knobs from the stove, or install an automatic shutoff switch.
- Use a padlock or childproof latches on cabinets that contain cleaning supplies or other hazardous materials.
- Lock up knives, scissors and other potentially dangerous utensils.
- Keep a fire extinguisher in the kitchen.
- When you are cooking, keep handles of pots and pans facing towards the back of the stove.
- Post a list of emergency numbers by the phone.
- Remove area rugs from under the table and from in front of the sink.
- Remove or secure small objects (e.g., matches and paper clips) and objects that appear edible that may be mistakenly eaten.



Stove Knob Covers \$7-\$60



Fire Safety

- Purchase a fire extinguisher for each level of the home (including the basement).
- Install smoke detectors for each level of the home (including the basement), and in your loved one's bedroom. Check smoke detector batteries regularly.
- Determine a fire emergency exit route and practice using it with all family members.
- Post the fire department emergency number in a prominent place.
- Keep lighters and matches locked up.
- Avoid the use of portable heaters.
- Guard radiators.
- Avoid running electrical cords in open spaces where your loved one can reach them or trip on them.
- Place childproof covers over plugs.

Wandering/Monitoring

- Use loose fitting covers on doorknobs, but only when a caregiver is present.
- Install locks high or low on the doors, or use locks that can only be opened with a key, but only when a caregiver is present. Secure locks on the opposite side of door so they cannot be unscrewed.
- Use double locks or two-step locks.
- Use alarm mats in front of doors, install portable alarms on doors or put bells on exit doors.
- Disguise doors by painting them the same color as walls and hanging scenic pictures or door sized murals on them.
- Disarm the automatic garage door opener.
- Install locks and alarms on windows, or devices that limit the distance they can be opened.
- Give a key to a neighbor or hide one outside.
- Get a FOUND medical identification bracelet for the person with dementia to notify rescuers, local police, medical staff and others of the person's condition in the event of an emergency. Consider one that identifies the caregiver, as a caregiver, too.
- Notify neighbors, local merchants and police about potential wandering.
- Keep a recent photo, a picture of the car and license plate, a profile form, and medical records together in a Silver Alert Kit.





Walk-Through Stair Gate \$30-\$35



General Precautions

- Secure locks on windows and doors; keep a spare key hidden outside the home or give one to a trusted nearby friend or neighbor.
- Remove and safely store potential hazards such as weapons and power tools.
- Protect computers and information stored on them.

Outside the Home

- Ensure steps and handrails are sturdy; consider installing treads for more traction, or possibly building a ramp.
- Mark the edges of steps and walkways with bright tape.
- Remove or level uneven surfaces.
- Ensure adequate outdoor lighting.
- Prune bushes and trees away from walkways and entryways.

Personal safety (especially for those who may wander)

- Hide car keys and, if necessary, disconnect the car battery so the person cannot drive.
- Do not leave the person alone in a parked car.

Aphasia Assistance Products

Communication Aids and Apps

- Aphasia is challenging for the individual and for the family and friends who support them. Finding a way to communicate needs and wants is essential to maintaining connection and to assure safety.
- Communication cards can be made by the user or the caregiver and can increase your loved ones ability to communicate with you. The images on the communication card or board can be common words or phrases, pictures, rating scales (to communicate preferences or pain), a family tree (for remembering names) or the alphabet.
- Communication cards or boards should be small enough to be easily used by the person with aphasia.
- Electronic apps and devices allow the user to create a sentence through pictures, symbols, or letters that are then read aloud by the computer. These devices may be available for demonstration and/or to borrow from the state's assistive technology program.




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Communication Cards

Communication cards could contain words (yes or no), phrases, or pictures to aid in communication.



Communication Board

A communication board compiles a variety of words, phrases, pictures, rating scales (to communicate preferences or pain) or the alphabet into one place to aid in communication.



Communication Book

Use a photo album or notebook to assemble pictures of common items and the faces of friends and family, to give a person with aphasia the ability to communicate with you.



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Communication Apps Prices Vary

Apps for phones, tablets, computers, or assistive devices, such as *Proloquo2Go*, *TouchChat*, *Small Talk*, *Tapgram*, and *Talk Tablet*, allow users to create sentences using symbols or letters that are read aloud by a computerized voice.
